A market for items usually overlooked

ASIDE from the usual jokes about Clare Hes work being rubbish, her new art installation, Market, serves up a slice of The Hythe most people don't usually see, or would prefer not to.

And by taking various items of junk and rubbish that she found alongside Colchester's portside area and turning them into sculptural pieces of furniture, Clare has mirrored the regeneration process that The Hythe is currently undergoing. Since her inclusion in the

East international 2002 show, Clare, who is based in Colchester, has mereasingly become known for ber sculptures created from discarded

objects.

Discovering them in often overlooked parts of towns and cities; to date Clare has kept the sculptures located in the place where she found the materials, documenting them with a digital camera. but for Market, commissioned especially by Firstsite, Clare has brought her pieces into the gallery.

Clare said: "I began assembling discarded objects and

photographing them against the sile mill, gipsy site and derelict maltines.

Next I started taking objects away with me in the car and began imagining them as goods on a market

The notion of a market stall was influenced by a trip Clare made to the Dominican Republic in 2001 when she came across a shanty style market.

For the installation, she has re-created a sofa inspired

by a chair she saw in the country that was made from recycled crates.

Clare added: "I have been working in The Hythe since January and I've enjoyed dascovering a bit more about the place.

Im really fond of the pieces that I've created and to be honest I don't want to sell any of them. After the show they will probably chitter up my house.
